

e can begin to make the Earth shine!

There is a story by Irene Johanson about the disciple Andrew who is a fisherman and a star gazer. One night when he is gazing up at the wonder of the starry heavens he witnesses a great shower of falling stars coming from the area of Capricorn such as he has never seen before. As he watches he is gripped by a new inspiration: "From now on will work on the earth what until now has only worked in the world of stars. All good things will become possible through Him who has come from above, so that the earth itself will become a star. The 'star of love' will be her name."

From that time onwards "star laws" begin to apply to earthly existence through which matter becomes spirit and spirit becomes matter (transubstantiation) – only that now these laws begin to work through and with human souls. It has taken 2000 years for the seed of "star working" to ripen within the human soul. Now in our time it is the deepest - although still somewhat subconscious - yearning of the human soul to participate in the creative process of the earth's transformation. For us to do this we first had to awaken to our own individuality – our own individual sense of self as opposed to a group sense of identity and belonging.

St John is the great and ever-relevant bell ringer announcing this monumental transition into selfhood and calling on us to wake up to the immense consequences of this individuation. It changes everything to do with the religious-spiritual life; the social life; and with how we see ourselves in relation to the natural world, humanity and the spiritual world. For this reason John calls for radical change in how we think about and feel about absolutely everything. He says: "Wake up to the new reality and make it part of your life! In the first half of earthly existence and in the first half of every year you have been showered with gift upon gift from the world of stars. These gifts are only gifts when they are accepted. Wake up and accept them into your hearts and minds and do something with them."

In this regard we could say that the whole of humanity is now in puberty – in the process of awakening to selfhood and adulthood in which we need to find our own inner authority; our own inner motivator, our own inner aims and goals, our own inner teacher, our own inner compass and anchor, our own inner laws, our own inner morality and above all our own inner relationship to Christ and the spiritual world which makes all the rest possible. As with every young person at the threshold of adulthood we yearn for this whole process to be confirmed and strengthened. This adult confirmation is provided with every celebration of the Eucharist which means 'thanksgiving' or its renewed form 'The Act of Consecration of Man'.

The spiritual world looks with great longing for signs of people who have accepted the outpouring of Christ as a gift. For through accepting it, through trying to understand what this gift really means; through allowing it to live in our lives so that we truly take hold of our lives and step meaningfully into (Cont. on Page 2) ...

our own adulthood; we begin to become co-workers and therefore co-creators of the future of earthly existence together with the angelic world. This is not just a nice scenario to have but rather an absolute essential if we wish to have a humane and sustainable world in which humanity is going to be able to attain to its own fulfillment. When we commit ourselves to the path of truly coming into our own in this way, then something begins to flow in the opposite direction to the falling stars that Andrew saw.

Our efforts create a vessel within our souls in which those falling star forces can begin to work in and through us. Then when we go to sleep at night, the fruits of our striving begin to ray up from our hearts as a reversed shower of rising stars – and the earth begins to shine in a transformative manner.

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The Cape Town Diaspora.

(Having visited the younger generation of Choulers in Stanford when I was on leave during May, they happily forwarded us their story of life in the country. If ever you pass through that region you may want to visit their restaurant/ fresh food market, called "Graze". The food is organic and delicious - their coffee will put a spring in your step! Marilize.)

PEOPLE ALWAYS ASK HOW we ended up in Stanford – the short answer is that it started at The Christian Community with an announcement made by Hille Sieckmann, and responded to by my dad, Charles Chouler.

Coincidentally or serendipitously Tabby and I were desperately looking for a 'place in the country' to settle away from the rush of city life. The Sieckmanns were also looking for someone to help on their flower farm near Stanford. This was the first step in the right direction for us and through the generosity of the Sieckmanns it allowed us to pursue our dreams of growing vegetables, keeping bees and animals (chickens, ducks and pigs) and it gave us our first experience of farm life - and we loved it!

However, first the animals started to multiply and then we too, with the impending arrival of our first child, making us realize that we had in fact outgrown our little cottage and farmyard on "Wildgarten". After two eventful years it was time to move on.

Having initially spent most of our time on the farm enjoying the space and tranquility we slowly but surely began to discover the nearby village of Stanford which we soon realized was far from a one horse dorpie. Instead it had a vibrant community and was full of interesting characters, many of whom are in fact Cape Town escapees themselves and a few of which we realized we knew.

This opened up the opportunity for us to start selling our excess farm produce, vegetables, eggs and honey at the village's Saturday morning market. We were surprised at the enthusiasm and support from the locals and it inspired us to continue and expand our production with a focus on free range pork and poultry as well as naturally grown vegetables and raw honey.

Much like having kids this has turned out to be a really long term project where we have very few answers and learn as we go along.



Having found a nice new home on nearby Walshacres farm and with our daughter Ripley fast approaching her first birthday we decided to jump at an opportunity to take over a small restaurant in the village, which would allow Tabby to put her passion and skills as a chef to good use and give us an outlet for some of our farm produce as well as a balance to domestic life.

This has turned out to be an amazing experience not least due to the support and enthusiasm of our guests and visitors who appreciate the effort that we make and understand the philosophy behind our *Slow Food Cafe*.

Having more or less got everything under control with a good balance of home/ farm and work life we received news that our adoption application was successful and we would soon receive another call to come and collect a new little son/daughter. This happened on New Year's Eve 2013 and after a few days we were the proud new parents of baby boy Thando –short for Othandway, 'the one who is loved'. This beautiful little angel is now 10 months old and his not so angelic sister Ripley has just turned 3. Needless to say I have stopped counting grey hairs and lost hours of sleep, and we will at some point regain control....



Life itself is serving a higher purpose - serving our growing, becoming and awakening to our God-Selves. It is our deepest challenges which afford us the greatest opportunity for growth. Knowing this in our heart of hearts, we are able to meet all that comes our way with a sense of deep gratitude.

Speaking from personal experience, it was almost eight year ago that Simon, my eldest son, died suddenly. Thus began the greatest, most challenging and most beautiful journey within the journey of my life.

I knew intuitively that behind this tragedy lay a great gift, that it would lead me somewhere, that the greatest gift I could give to Simon was to transform my grief, that I was to live with love and joy in my heart and share love and joy in the world. I understood that this event had occurred for both of us, that Simon had completed his work on the physical plane and was called to other tasks. I loved him beyond what mere words could express and I felt deeply grateful to him for having come to me as my son in this lifetime, that I honoured his gift to me and let him go in freedom and with great love in my heart. Simon would still be here for me as he always was. The "knowing" was crystal clear.

A small glimpse of my path forward: I had no idea where I was heading other than that I would be guided and receive all the help I needed, and that there was nothing to fear. I would be required to enter many dark places of self-confrontation - Portals of Darkness - and find my way through them. It could only be a spiritual path - a path of overflowing gratitude to Simon and to life itself, inner listening, inner conversation with Simon, meditative prayer, present moment living, actively living in harmony with the invisible spiritual love-imbued world



which is within us and all around us, seeing the Divine everywhere, seeing Love everywhere, living with trust that every moment was perfect and so much more

Through the process of transformation one discovers what it is to be truly alive. A warm glowing light inside becomes a flame - a flame of Love, inspiration, joy. One trusts completely and lives without fear. One's life becomes one of service to God, and in service to all who share this earth with us. We walk humbly alongside our fellow human beings, seeing each as a unique expression of Divine Love.

Such a journey can lead to sharing the blessings of one's own journey with others. So it has been and will continue to be so for me.



Dear Friends,

Although my lovely time in Europe had come to an end, I returned just in time to be able to take part in the wonderful Silver Wedding celebration of Christina and Richard. May I take this opportunity to thank all who prepared the space so festively and cooked a most delicious meal. The excellent preparation towards this event proved to me again that we are a strong community and I am proud to be part of it.

Some of you might have noticed that workmen have been busy and it appears that now the secretary's tower and all rooms below have become waterproof; a section of the roof has been replaced and the tower wall has been coated with a waterproofing membrane. Thanks to a kind and efficient repairman, we have also finally managed, hopefully for good, to sort out the longstanding plumbing problem. The next step will be a visit from the electrician and after that the income from last year's fair will most likely have been used up and we shall have to wait with further repairs till the end of November.

What is still a matter of urgency is the floor in the chapel. Apparently, it creaks so violently that our dear priest finds it difficult to hold a service. We are in the process of obtaining quotes for repairs or replacement and have already received a very generous offer for 50 % of the total cost. This, of course, leaves the other 50 % and dare I hope that maybe a few people will find it in their hearts – and purses – to foot the bill for the balance. Please let me know if you are able and willing to contribute. As you know, the contributions barely cover the day to day running costs and we cannot meet extraordinary expenses.

On a general note, regarding the monthly income, I can say that we are still battling along valiantly. Several people can at present no longer meet their commitments and I hope that others can fill the current void somewhat. Please remember that many people are not able to pay the suggested monthly contribution of R480 but can only commit to a part thereof. Therefore, if anybody can increase their payment to a bit more than what is asked, it would be most welcome.
